
SLPOA hopes to establish this as a recurring annual event. We anticipate continued involvement in the years ahead and encourage other officers to consider participating as well.



A Heartfelt Reminder: Please Review and Update Your Beneficiaries

We all know the weight we carry every day—the risks, the long shifts, the worry we sometimes hide from our families. And when tragedy strikes one of our own, the grief ripples through our entire police family. Recently, our Police Relief Association has had to deliver several \$30,000 death benefit checks to beneficiaries who, through no fault of their own, were no longer the intended recipients—often former spouses named back in the academy, before marriages, children, or life's many changes reshaped what truly matters most.

Watching families endure not only the loss of a loved one but also the added pain of benefits going to someone from a past chapter of life has been heartbreaking for everyone involved. The widows, children, and close family members who stand by us through thick and thin deserve every bit of support we can provide in their darkest hour. *These situations aren't about blame—they're a quiet reminder of how easy it is to overlook paperwork amid the demands of our profession and personal lives.*

The same issue has arisen with department life insurance policies and Police Retirement System disbursements. An outdated designation can unintentionally deepen the sorrow for those left behind, when the goal is always to offer comfort and security.

We never want another family to face this unnecessary pain. That's why I'm asking—please, take a few minutes today or this week—to review your

beneficiaries across these important protections:

- Police Relief Association Death Benefit — Contact Executive Secretary Dave Wilson at (314) 771-0923 for a simple change form.
- Department Life Insurance Policies — Reach out to Benefits at cityemployeesbenefits@stlouis-mo.gov (Please bear in mind that by the time of publication, the re-instituted Police Department Benefits office might have been move back in-house)
- Police Retirement System Disbursements — Call (314) 241-0800 for changes.
- Additionally, SLPOA pays a \$1000 death benefit. Call (314) 353-3200 to make any beneficiary changes.
- Finally, make sure your credit union and bank account, along with any investment vehicle beneficiaries are up to date.

Life changes—marriages, divorces, new babies, or the passing of a loved one—happen, and so should our beneficiary updates. Doing this now gives you peace of mind and ensures your benefits reach exactly who you want to support: the people who love and depend on you today.

Take care of yourselves and your loved ones. Stay safe out there.

MESSAGE FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

Real Progress

The Board of Police Commissioners is in full swing. The senate has confirmed their appointments, they've rolled up their sleeves and we are starting to see some real progress. The SLPOA has successfully negotiated a successor Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Department and the Board of Police Commissioners. This process marked a distinct improvement over previous interactions with City government, as the Board demonstrated from the outset a commitment to achieving a mutually beneficial Agreement for both officers and the Department. The resulting agreement stands as one of the strongest contracts established in recent years.

The updated Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs) for Sergeants and Police Officers include a 7% increase to the pay matrix, with wage reopeners scheduled for fiscal years 2027 and 2028. Improvements have also been made to the vacation schedule, and line platoon officers now have the opportunity to participate in the internship program, which was inactive for several years. The contract further standardizes sick time allocation, sick bonus days, holidays, and related benefits by eliminating the two-tier system for all members. Additionally, it reinstates the sick leave donation program to support officers facing serious medical conditions.

The new CBA ensures representation in decisions concerning medical insurance, labor management issues, and all other Board committees. This contract affirms the Department's adherence to the Law Enforcement Officers' Bill Of Rights, an important provision previously ignored by the City. It establishes a grievance process for individuals and grants the Association authority to file grievances on behalf of its members, including binding arbitration for those submitted by the Association. The agreement also includes Impasse Interest Arbitration for non-economic matters, reflecting the Board's intention to foster a positive working relationship with the Association through good faith negotiations going forward. These are some of the many key provisions from the new CBA. For further details, please refer to the full document which can be found on the SLPOA Website

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all those who contributed to the successful completion of this initiative. I extend my gratitude to SLPOA President Martin Garcia, Labor Chairman Trevor Russell, and General Counsel Brian Millikan. Special thanks are also due to Negotiating Team member Bill Clinton and all members of the SLPOA Labor Committee. From the Department, Chief Tracy, Dave Daniels, Sara Koziacki, and Major Joe Morici worked tirelessly to get this over the finish line. Additionally, the Board's Labor Chairman, Commissioner Don Brown, Board President Chris Saracino, Board Attorney Chris Graville, and his staff, including Attorney Jennifer McGillivray, played a crucial role in achieving this outcome.

This finished product demonstrates the ability of the Department and the Board of Police Commissioners to work within a budget, that was already established by the City, to provide these raises for officers. In addition to addressing financial considerations, the Board clearly wanted to ensure that officers and sergeants within this department felt supported through this agreement by agreeing to terms that would improve the morale and working conditions of this department. We hope that this new agreement will lead to the recruitment and retention of high-quality police officers and be the stepping stone to reestablish the SLMPD as the premier law enforcement agency in the region. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Missouri General Assembly Convenes for 2026 Legislative Session

The Missouri General Assembly convened on Wednesday, January 7, 2026, marking the start of the 2026 Regular Session and the second regular session of the 103rd General Assembly. The session will run through mid-May, with a constitutionally required veto session scheduled for September.

Opening Day Activity

Opening day in both the House and Senate was largely procedural, with leadership outlining expectations for the year ahead, and bills being referred to committee. Despite the ceremonial nature of the first day, the volume of legislation already filed points to a busy and active session, as record number of bills were pre-filed this year. Major issue areas expected to dominate the session include projected shortfalls in the state budget, Governor Kehoe's attempt to phase out individual income tax, property tax reform, public safety, health care, and education.

Political Landscape

Republicans continue to hold strong majorities in both chambers. The session unfolds following a contentious 2025 marked by debates over abortion policy and redistricting. Those disputes continue to influence dynamics in the Senate, where leadership has acknowledged the need for cohesion amid lingering tensions. While House leaders have indicated they expect business to proceed at a steady pace, the overall rhythm of the session may depend on how Senate floor dynamics develop in the coming weeks.

Leadership Priorities and Senate Messaging

Senate President Pro Tem Cindy O'Laughlin, and Senate Majority Floor Leader Tony Luetkemeyer spoke publicly about Senate priorities heading into the 2026 session.

O'Laughlin emphasized a renewed focus on budget discipline and accountability, highlighting a move toward priority-based budgeting within the Senate Appropriations Committee. Under this approach, state agencies will be expected to clearly define goals, measure performance, and demonstrate results tied to funding decisions. Leadership framed this effort as stewardship of taxpayer dollars rather than across-the-board cuts, particularly considering reduced federal support and tighter revenue conditions.

Luetkemeyer identified real property tax relief as the top priority among Senate Republicans this session, noting it polled as the number one issue among GOP senators during their caucus retreat. He stressed that the focus is not on eliminating property taxes, but on improving predictability and preventing steep assessment-driven increases that could price homeowners, particularly seniors and working families, out of their homes. Proposals discussed publicly include caps or limits tied to inflation or set percentages.

Both leaders reiterated the Senate's intention to work with Governor Mike Kehoe on a gradual and fiscally responsible path toward eliminating the state income tax, with additional details expected in the Governor's State of the State Address.

Budget Outlook

Fiscal issues are expected to be a central focus of the early portion of the 2026 legislative session. Each year, the General Assembly's primary

constitutional obligation is to adopt a balanced state budget, and lawmakers are entering the process under increasingly constrained fiscal conditions.

The state's enacted FY 2026 budget totals approximately \$50.8 billion, encompassing both operating expenditures and capital improvements. Of that amount, roughly \$15.4 billion is supported by general revenue, which funds the state's core ongoing programs and services. Current estimates project a \$2.6 billion gap between anticipated general revenue collections and appropriations included in the existing budget.

Several factors are contributing to the tightening fiscal outlook, including softer revenue growth, reduced levels of federal support compared to recent years, and continued upward pressure on spending. In response, Kehoe has indicated that his FY 2027 budget proposal, to be presented during his State of the State Address on Tuesday, January 13, will be structured to bring expenditures into closer alignment with current revenue projections.

Tax policy will remain closely intertwined with the budget discussion. Income taxes account for approximately 65 percent of Missouri's general revenue, making any proposal to phase out or eliminate the income tax a significant consideration in the budget-writing process. Legislative leaders in both chambers are closely watching how the administration proposes to address revenue replacement, timing, and long-term fiscal sustainability as those discussions move forward.

Early Legislative Activity

Activity accelerated quickly on Thursday, as both chambers began formally referring legislation to committee:

- The Senate referred 185 bills
- The House referred 197 bills

These referrals mark the transition from organizational work to substantive committee activity.

Police Commissioners Confirmed

St. Louis Police Commissioners Saracino, McVey, Artega, Jenkins-Gray and Brown spent many hours in the halls of the Capitol on January 27th and 28th in preparation of their confirmation hearing before the Senate Gubernatorial Appointments Committee. Martin Garcia, Nick Hayden, Joe Stieger, and Jay Schroeder accompanied the Commissioners over the course of the two days. The Commissioners met with all members of the committee, as well as Senate leadership and Governor Mike Kehoe. On Wednesday afternoon, the committee voted unanimously to approve the Commissioners to their respective terms, thus advancing their names for consideration before the full Senate. The Commissioners were approved by the full Senate on Tuesday, February 3rd.

Hang Up On Unexpected Calls Saying You Owe Back Taxes. Those Are Scams

impersonator and get real help:

- Never give an unexpected caller personal or financial information. It's probably a scammer hoping to drain your bank accounts or steal your identity.
- Check it out through IRS.gov. Contact the IRS directly for trustworthy information about your tax situation. Need to speak with someone? Only use a phone number found on the IRS's website. Never one a scammer gives you.
- Read up on how government imposter scams work. Start with [ftc.gov/imposters](https://www.ftc.gov/imposters) and if you spot a scam, tell the FTC at [ReportFraud.ftc.gov](https://www.ftc.gov/report-fraud).

We're seeing a big wave of reports about phone scams claiming you owe back taxes. But it's not the IRS calling, it's a scammer using a company name like "Tax Resolution Oversight Department." If someone calls you out of the blue offering to help you fix a tax issue, hang up. Here's how to spot the scam.

It starts with an unexpected call from the "Tax Mediation and Resolution Agency," or another official-sounding (but fake) government agency. They'll say you haven't paid your taxes and offer to connect you with a "tax resolution officer," who can do a "red flag check" on your credit and help you apply for an "IRS liability reduction program." But those aren't real programs and that's your sign to end the call. Some scammers leave a voicemail saying, "This may be our only attempt to reach you" hoping you'll call back right away. But it's all part of the story to steal personal information like your Social Security number — or in some cases, charge you an illegal upfront fee for tax debt relief that doesn't actually help.

Even if you owe back taxes, know this: the IRS's first contact with you will always come by mail, not by phone. Here's how to avoid an IRS

all the way up to Chief of Police.

I prayed for you and with you at roll calls, police ceremonies, and in my own personal, private prayer. I baptized your children, officiated at your weddings and funerals, and gave my condolences at visitations for deceased officers or family members. I will always cherish the years that I
